COMPANY DESCRIPTION

KAITE is a company based in Zimbabwe Africa. The KAITE Initiative was founded to realise the vision of sustainable human development. KAITE aims to contribute to the comprehensive development of the individual, society and environment. A holistic concept encompassing integrated economic, social and cultural development in a manner that sustains the environment and promotes biodiversity forms the key KAITE vision.

In line with this vision, KAITE, now a UEBT trading member, upholds the values of the UEBT whose value is "Sourcing with Respect" of ingredients that come from native biodiversity. Members commit to gradually ensuring that their sourcing practices promote the conservation of biodiversity, respect traditional knowledge and assure the equitable sharing of benefits all along the supply chain.'

Since 2009 KAITE is harvesting naturally occurring plant products from eight different regions of Zimbabwe. The essential oil plants Tagetes minuta and Tarchonanthus camphoratus found in the Bindura/Glendale/Epworth area and Bubi areas respectively and Strophanthus kombe which is found in Binga. We have expanded the harvesting of the naturally occurring crops to include Harpagophytum procumbens found in the Hwange area; Baobab fruit in Chipinge as well as Myrothamnus flabellifolius found in Murewa.

Progress made on the Biodiversity Management System (BMS)

KAITE is working with and organization in Zimbabwe (BIZ) on the species that KAITE is currently involved in and the species that KAITE would like to be involved in in the future. Research is being conducted on the impact of the wild harvesting on biodiversity. Trials on propagation of tagetes and baobab are being conducted. This research is to ensure sustainable use of the resources is maintained.

KAITE has updated the Internal Control system (KICS) which outlines the sustainable harvesting of the specei on our IPA. The processing procedures that have also been outlined in the documents. The policies on sustainable harvesting have been developed and have been explained to the various employees that are involved in the activities. The objective of the interna trainings and harvesting manuals were to ensure that the staff at KAITE are equipped with the technical know how of engaging with communities on the issues of sustainability, purchasing and community engagement..n

We are currently working towards sensitizing our customers on our commitments to UEBT and the collector communities regarding fair and equitable sharing of benefits.

Steady progress is being made with regards to issues surrounding Principal 3, Principal 6 and Principal 7.

Currently research is being conducted on propagating Baobab. KAITE has partnered with a research organization that is assisting researching the effects of wild harvesting activities conducted by KAITE to monitor biodiversity in the areas KAITE harvests as well as Risk management particularly for the new speceies that KAITE has begun to work with.

Principle 3. Fair and equitable sharing of benefits

Management system	Our main activities in 2012 have been to ensure that all our customers are aware of our UEBT commitments and this is communicated and considered in all price negotiations: KAITE is working towards Fairtrade certification of the partner communities of collectors whom we partner with. KAITE attends Fairs such as Biofach where product prices are negotiated.
Supply chain	By preparing for Fairtrade certification, KAITE has managed to train all the collectors on issues of pricing as well as equitable sharing of benefits. Collectors who partner with KAITE all sign contracts prior to engaging in the farming activities. Prices are negotiated with the collectors at beginning of the season.

Management system	KAITE gets regular training from a partner; Bio Innovation Zimbabwe regarding the rights of the actors in all the activity areas. KAITE is also in communication with the national authorities involved in the monitoring of the local legistlation on rights of actors. Trainings for KAITE staff and communities on national and international laws governing the rights of actors will continue.
Supply chain	KAITE has identified the sites of significance and respect rituals, by laws and activities in the areas of collection. We have also been able to engage the chiefs and headmen in the areas where wild collection activities are conducted so that we are able to ensure that all rituals that are required by the community are followed and that and the harvesting does not interfere with areas of significance. All traditional leaders are

consulted in regards to the cultural significance of the species being
harvested.

Principle 7. Clarity about land tenure, right of use and access to natural resources

Management system	KAITE seeks approval from local authorities for its activities in all the areas that it is working in prior to conducting activities. Permission to access the land is sought from the relevant Ministry, the Provincial Office, the District Administrator and in the case of timber products the Forestry Commission.
Supply chain	The chief and headman who are the traditional custodians of the land are involved in all the meetings and negotiations that KAITE has with the collecters. The custodians of the land in the same light have to sign Prior Informed Consent documents facilitating the process that allows KAITE to begin the harvesting activities.

We are currently communicating with relevant authorities to secure Prior Informed Consent to formalise our activities in communities that KAITE would like to introduce wild collection activities.
